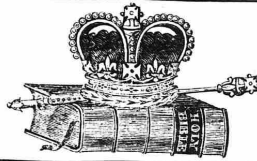

DEATH OF THE REV. J. H. MARSDEN.—We have to record the death on the 24th inst., at his residence, Grey-friars, Colchester, in his 88th year, of the Rev. John Howard Marsden, B.D., F.R.S.L. Mr. Marsden was the eldest son of the Rev. William Marsden, B.D., vicar of Eccles, in Lancashire. At Cambridge he won the Bell University Scholarship and the Seatonian Prize for English verse, taking his degree in 1829 as Senior Optime and first class in the Classical Tripos, and being subsequently elected a Fellow of St. John's College. He was appointed Select Preacher to the University in 1834, 1837, and 1847, Hulsean Lecturer in 1843 and 1844, and he held the Disney Professorship of Archaeology from 1851 to 1865. He was rector of Great Oakley, Essex, for 49 years, only resigning it in 1889 on account of the infirmities of age. In 1858 he was elected to a residential canonry in Manchester Cathedral, which he held till 1874, being also domestic chaplain to the Bishop of Manchester and rural dean. Canon Marsden, until his health failed last July, was an active magistrate in Essex. Throughout his long life he devoted his leisure to literary pursuits, more especially to numismatical and archaeological research. His publications include two volumes of "Hulsean Lectures," the "Life of Sir Simon d'Ewes, or College Life in the time of James I.," two "Introductory Lectures on the Study of Archaeology," and "Philomorum on the Poems of Sir Thomas More."
