


“Articles agreed upon the 27 of Aug. 1648. by and betwene the Commissioners of his Excellency the Lord Generall Fairfax on th'one part, and the Commissioners of the Earl of Norwich, Lord Ca/pell, and Sir Charles Lucas on the other part, for and concerning the Rendition of the Town and Garrison of Colchester.”



That all private soldiers and officers under Captains shall draw together into ye fryars yard adjoining to ye East Gate by 10 of the clock tomorrow morning with their clothes and baggage; their persons to be rendered into the custody of such as the said Genl shall appoint to take the charge of them, and that they shall have ^{fair} quarter according to the explanation made in the booke to ye first Quarter of ye Comd from Colchester, with 15 pence a week.

That all private soldiers and officers under captain shall be drawn together into ye fryars yard adjoining to ye East Gate by 10 of the clock tomorrow morning with their clothes and baggage; their persons to surrender into the custody of such as the said General shall appoint to take the charge of them, and that they shall have fair quarter according to the explanation

“By fair quarter we understand, that with fair quarter, for their lives, they shall be free from wounding or beating, shall enjoy warm clothes to cover them, and keep them warm, shall be maintained with victuals fit for prisoners, whilst they shall be kept prisoners.”

27th August 1648 72 Lieutenants. / 69 Ensigns / 183 Serjeants and Corporals / 3,067 Private Soldiers / 65 Servants (to the Lords and General Officers and Gentlemen) 3,400+ out of circa 5,600 who entered the town
